Description of Intimate Partner Violence

Definition

- Intimate partner violence (IPV) is a collection of behaviors that include physical, sexual, emotional, psychological, and financial abuse (Meehan & Gae, 2012, p. 14).

 - Sexual and physical abuse, including sexual coercion, sexual harassment, and sexual assault (Jewell, 2006, 2009).
 - Battery (a physical assault or battery) and sexual abuse, including sexual harassment, sexual coercion, and sexual assault (Alameda & Dwyer, 1999, p. 313).

The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) conducted the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (NISVS) in 2010 (<http://www.cdc.gov/NISVS/>).
